# NEWSLETTER for Blackwell First School

...developing the whole child...

February 2020

Dear Families,

Our annual external review took place in January and we use the information and report to support us with our drive to continually develop the provision and practice at Blackwell.

OFSTED does not routinely inspect schools that have been judged Outstanding unless there are significant changes in data or safeguarding. This may change from September 2020 as the Department for Education has consulted on their intention to inspect schools previously rated as outstanding.

This year, headteachers from the Bromsgrove Learning Network reviewed the school and their judgements were Quality Assured by an Inspector on behalf of Worcestershire County Council.

During the year, Governors monitor the work of the school independently and this term their focus is on the breadth of the curriculum. They will be joined by Governors from another Worcestershire School who will learn from Blackwell's governors as part of their development work. They will also monitor the afternoon clubs.

These take place between 1.50-3pm and offer the children a wide range of activities that do not form part of the National Curriculum. These clubs support the children's social skills as well as life skills such as independence and resilience. They also enable the children to apply learned skills from lessons in different contexts. It is important for the Governors to understand the value of the clubs as a proportion of the school budget is spent on enabling this innovative approach to the school day to happen. Thanks to all involved in our external reviews, staff, governors and external reviewers. Below are excerpts from our review: *...high levels of engagement and very positive learning behaviours for all groups*...

...high expectations of learners and well-chosen interactive learning opportunities...

...continuous provision enables pupils to access a broad and rich curriculum with opportunities to apply learned skills...

# COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

#### Parent Consultations - keeping you informed

Now that we are in the second term of the year, we can reflect on the children's progress so far this year. It is time for Parent Consultation meetings soon and letters will be sent home shortly for you to book appointments. These times are opportunities to consider the children's progress so far this year, share information regarding their social and emotional development and any other relevant information that the teachers or families find useful to share. If you have specific issues that will require further discussion, the classteachers may advise you to book a separate appointment so that they do not keep other parents waiting unnecessarily. School termly reports will also be sent home following this consultation and these are designed to keep you informed of your child's individual progress and targets. As a school we aim to keep you informed about how to support your child and also about their progress through:

- School newsletters that keep you up to date with school events as well as educational news;
- Class newsletters and homework sheets that share the learning in each class so that you are aware of learning in all curriculum areas each half term;
- Early Years workshops;
- Reports (1 short and 1 longer), that provide information on your child's progress in line with the assessments teachers complete in school;
- Information meetings prior to moving year group
  and
- Termly parent consultations.

We know that a small minority of parents feel that they would like further information on their child's progress and we urge parents to make appointments with teachers if this is felt necessary outside of regular meetings.

#### Hungry Little Minds

The Government has launched the 'Hungry Little Minds' campaign, designed to support families in providing the best start for young children.

The campaign provides information on developing the children's minds from birth-5 and the activities are simple and fun for both children and adults.
