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NEWSLETTER for Blackwell First School- Blue Class

TOPIC

The fascinating history of the 'Native Americans' is our new topic. The children's learning will form this year's class assembly that will be shared with families virtually this year.



On the first day back, the children developed their thinking and reasoning skills by solving a dilemma linked to the Native American 'Trail of Tears'. Sharing ideas, reasoning, considering different viewpoints and making decisions all help develop strong learning behaviours and creative thinking alongside learning about historical events.

History and DT are the main subjects taught during this topic. All History learning will be guided by this question: Family was more important to Native Americans in the past than it is to us today. Do you challenge or agree with this statement? Children will learn to interpret primary and secondary sources to develop their chronological understanding, develop their understanding of events and their consequences and also compare time periods.


In DT lessons, children will be creating a Native American style outfit for a soft toy. After exploring existing designs, children will design their own and then develop the skills needed to create it – the use of templates and different sewing stitches in particular. After creating their outfits, they will evaluate against the design criteria.



LITERACY

During this topic, the children will be reading and writing a range of genres including poetry, stories and non-fiction texts.



When reading, they will be given

opportunities to share opinions, ask questions, spot patterns in language, infer and discuss words and phrases that the authors use to capture the reader's interest and imagination. As a school, we continually identify and discuss language to develop their vocabulary in their speech and writing.

Writing is a skill that requires a lot of resilience and has been an area of challenge nationally during lockdown. To support this, the children will be given opportunities to write little and often to further develop their writing skills and stamina. The application of good language will be modelled alongside writing sentences with a variety of structures.

In Spelling, the children will be taught how to use the prefixes il- in-, -im and -ir and how they change the meaning of root words, words spelt with 'ei', 'eigh' and 'ey' and homophones.

The tricky words for this half term are on the Blue Class homework sheet. It would be great if the children could practise these tricky words at home.

<u>NUMERACY</u>

During Numeracy, the main focus will be multiplication and division. They will develop their understanding of place value by multiplying and dividing numbers by 10 and 100. They will develop efficient mental methods to multiply and divide 2-digit numbers by 4, 8, 5, 50 and 25 and use formal written methods for more complex calculations. Concrete apparatus and pictorial methods will be used to secure their understanding before moving on to abstract methods. Application of these skills will be through solving word problems when bar modelling will again be used to support their problem solving skills. Length including area and perimeter will also be taught this half term.

Mental maths will focus on: reading/writing numbers to 10,000+; rounding; securing their accuracy of halving even numbers in the 30s, 50s, 70s, 90s; doubling and halving greater numbers using place value knowledge i.e. double 3,700; counting in 25s and 50s; 7 and 9 times tables and; continuing to develop their fluency and accuracy when adding and subtracting 2 2-digit numbers mentally involving crossing the 10s i.e. 54 + 17 and 72 – 25.
