1. Preheat the oven to $180^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$.
2. Line a 22 cm round cake tin with baking paper and grease the sides so that the cake does
not stick.
3. Using an electric beater, cream the butter, sugar and vanilla essence until light and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time. beating well after each addition.
4. Sift the cocoa powder. flour and baking powder together and add to the creamed mixture
5. Bake for 45-55 minutes or until the cake springs back when lightly touched. Leave in the
Dake for $45-55$ minutes or until the cake springs back when lightly touched. Leave in the
tin for 10 minutes before turning out onto a wire rack to cool.
6. While the cake is cooling. prepare the chocolate ganache. Pour the cream into a saucepan and heat gently. Bring up to a simmer but do not boil. Take it off the heat and add the broken-up chocolate, stirring until all of the chocolate is melted.
7. When the cake is cooled and on a plate. pour the chocolate ganache over the top of the cake. For something extra special, try topping the cake with: edible flowers: - fresh raspberries and strawberries:

- or grated white chocolate or white chocolate curls.
- jelly worms (you can make it look like they are wriggling up out of soil):
