The children had a very successful first term, are familiar with routines and expectations and are now ready to be challenged even further to develop their academic skills, independence and skills for life. We enjoyed a thought-provoking day on Wednesday where the children explored a range of paintings and photographs from the past and present depicting wealthy and poor families. A dilemma was then presented to the children: Should all members of modern day society be able to access 'tasty' treats? (This links with our new topic.) The children came up with creative solutions, showing great empathy and it provided them with the opportunity to consider different viewpoints alongside developing social and moral awareness, all of which underpin our school vision, key values and competencies. We have many engaging learning opportunities planned for the term, involving daily reading and writing activities, a range of foundation subject investigations and new knowledge and skills to learn, enjoy and rehearse supporting the development of lifelong learners. We look forward to sharing in the children's learning journey with you throughout the term.

### **TOPIC**

'Build a Business' is our new topic and the children will be planning their own learning and skills needed to set up their own 'Tasty Treat' business,

using solutions from their dilemma-based learning. You will hear more about it as the children develop and promote their ideas and hopefully you will be able to support and enjoy their enterprise!

D.T. and Science are the main subjects taught during this topic. Cooking and nutrition is the area of focus in D.T. and this is where our business will really kick off! After researching what is already available in the market, children will design their own recipe for tasty bread and design eye-catching packaging too, linking to our literacy story. You will have the opportunity to pre-order some of our tasty treats and we will bake them to perfection for you to savour!

In Science lessons, children will take inspiration from famous scientists in the past, using their stories to learn more about what makes a good scientist. Then they will explore changes in states of matter, defining solids, liquids and gases and planning a fair test to explore changes of state. This will help them to understand the scientific processes behind their bread making in D.T. Children will use their new knowledge to help understand how the water cycle works too.
