Learning Activities for Take a Trip – for the first six weeks of this half term			
<p>TO SUPPORT LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT AND SPEAKING AND LISTENING SKILLS:</p> <p>Hot seat Nelson Mandela or Rosa Parks. Ask a grownup to ask you five questions. Think carefully about what their responses might have been and speak clearly, in full sentences and in detail when giving your answers.</p>	<p><u>Listen to Rain, Rain, Beautiful Rain</u> by the South African group <u>Ladysmith Black Mambazo</u> (see website below). <u>Create a dance which shows the coming of the rain and the growing of the plants.</u></p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> listen to music pick events to match music e.g. falling of the rain... create simple dance motifs to portray events link motifs in interesting ways 	<p><u>Watch the National Geographic videos about each continent of Planet Earth and see what fascinating facts you can discover.</u></p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> watch each video using the link below and make notes about what you learn decide which facts are the most fascinating create a poster, fact card or powerpoint to share this information (we will learn about powerpoint in computing lessons) 	<p>Practise these mental maths facts and skills:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 7-, 9- and 12-times tables and corresponding division facts until you know them by heart recognising factors and factor pairs i.e. factors of 24 are 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 12 and 24; factor pairs of 24 are 1 and 24, 2 and 12, 3 and 8 and 4 and 6 recognise the following equivalences: $0.5 = \frac{1}{2}$, $0.25 = \frac{1}{4}$, $0.75 = \frac{3}{4}$

Research about him (link below to start off) and create a timeline of significant events in his life.</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> research and identify significant life events/times order the events chronologically create a timeline, labelling key dates 	<p><u>In Science, we will explore appliances that use battery or mains power. How are appliances powered in your home? Is there a pattern between the size of the appliance and the way it is powered?</u></p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> look at appliances at home (remember safety) record if they are mains or battery powered explain if you notice a pattern

<p><u>Choose your favourite sport and create your own glossary for it.</u></p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> choose 6-8 technical words linked to your chosen sport i.e. Cricket – stumps, wicket, boundary, googly... write a clear definition for each word write your glossary in alphabetical order 	<p>Create your own Wake and Shake routine as a way to exercise and stay healthy!</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> choose a piece of music (with repeats is best) listen to the number of beats in a bar and the tempo decide simple movements to create a sequence repeat these movements to the repeats of the music 	<p>Which historical sports have you never heard of? Watch the history of sport video (link below) and then research to find out about one of the historical sports.</p> <p>Focus:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> watch the video and make a note of the historical sports use safe internet searching to find information create a 'how to guide' to explain the sport maybe you could try it! 	<p>Practise all times tables up to 12 x 12.
