## Optional Blue Class Homework for 'Tell Me A Story' (4 weeks) and 'Christmas' (2 weeks)

In light of feedback from Parent Questionnaires in recent years, we will continue to underline tasks that are more easily completed by children independently, but will also include some worksheets at the request of some families.

Imagine you've stepped through a wardrobe into a fantasy world. Write a description of what it is like there. Have a look at his website (see below) and see if you can create art inspired by one of his pieces. Christian Birmingham uses coloured chalk pastels but you can choose the media you wish to use.  Focus:  choose media – e.g. pencils, paint, chalks/pastels. copy details exactly. include foreground and background details.	Draw a map of an imaginary land, suitable to become the setting of a fantasy story. Include a hero's home, two places where conflicts can occur, and a villain's lair. You might like to study a map of Narnia for ideas (see reverse). Create a comic strip, story board or flow diagram showing the main events in The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. Have a go at creating a simple melody or piece of music he might have used. You might like to record it or perform it to us.
