We're reading Stig of the Dump together at the moment. Pick 4 characters and think of a question you would ask each of them and then predict what you think their answer might be. Focus: • recall story • choose 4 interesting characters • be curious and pose interesting questions • using what you already know, make detailed predictions of their answers, giving reasons	Imagine that you are a Bronze Age or Iron Age child. You are sitting with your family around a fire. Compose a song to sing (write the words). Use a familiar tune for your song e.g. Row Row Row your boat, Baa Baa Black Sheep, Mary had a Little Lamb Focus: • choose words that will fit the correct rhythm of your tune • practise your song, singing with correct pitch and clear diction • consider dynamics	Life in prehistoric Britain was very different from life today. Was there anything that was the same as life today? Compare your life with the life of a child in prehistoric Britain. You might like to write a list or draw a table to explain your ideas. (see link below for a starting point for research) Focus: • what was different? • what was the same? • consider homes, families, food, towns, education	Practise these mental maths facts: • 2, 5 and 10 times table and corresponding division facts by heart and out of order • number bonds to 20, 100 or 1000 (multiples of 50) • doubles and halves to 100 (even numbers only for halving) • counting on and back in different steps including negative numbers
Imagine you're living during one of the prehistoric ages. Write a letter home to your family, telling them about what life is like.	Choose your favourite part from the story Stig of the Dump and make a detailed pencil drawing of it. Focus:	In the Bronze Age, people were buried alongside special or important belongings in mounds. Which belongings are particularly special to you?	Explore the features of either Microsoft Word or PowerPoint. Create either a poster or presentation about one of the Ages.

(link to music below) Focus: • think of daily jobs/routines • create dance motifs to a set number of beats to represent each job • link dance motifs • consider facial expressions • perform with confidence	Towards the end of the Stone Age, stone circles were put up around Britain. The most famous stone circle is at Stonehenge in Wiltshire, which began during the Stone Age but was an important religious place during the Bronze Age. Find out more about Stonehenge and create a leaflet for a tourist who is about to visit it. Focus: • careful research (useful website below) • pick out important information • present information clearly	In D.T. this term we will explore materials and mechanisms. Create your own axe or necklace – this could be from the Bronze Age or the Iron Age. Focus: • cutting and shaping materials • increasing stability e.g. layers of card • decorating effectively
